## Main Idea and Details

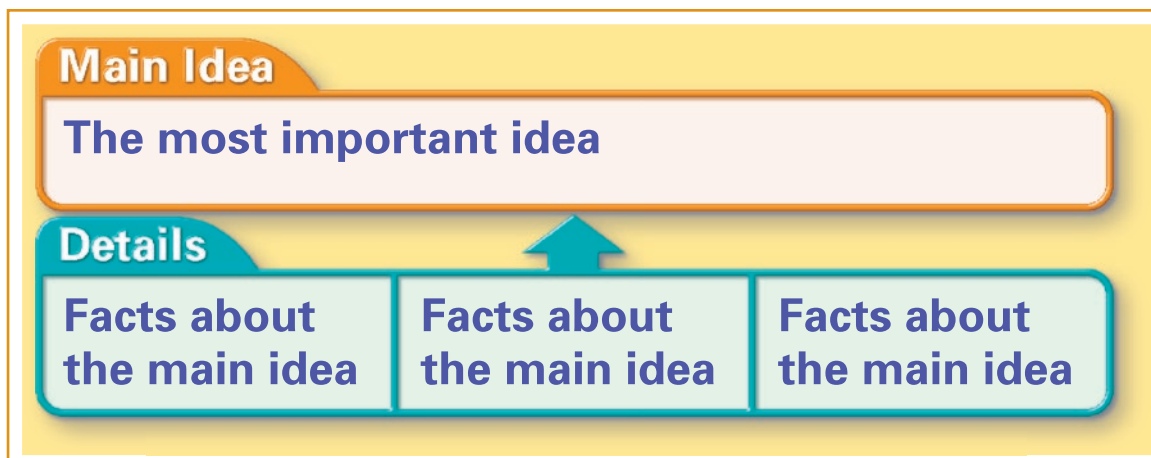

### Why It Matters

The **main idea** is the most important idea in the paragraph or passage. The main idea is often the first sentence in the paragraph or first paragraph in a passage.

Finding the main idea can help you quickly identify the topic and understand what the paragraph or passage is about. The supporting **details** help you better understand the main idea.

Using a graphic organizer can help you keep track of the main idea and details. This can help you see how details, such as facts, ideas, and other information, are related. This will help you better understand what you are reading.
